
In her newest book, Mary-Anne brings the tale of Australian pilots in Gallipoli and the Western Front, and the unlikely friendships they formed with enemy air

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Musical Chairs for Deputy Mayors - at Hornsby Shire Council

uring the February General Meeting for Hornsby Shire Council, Councillor Nathan Tilbury was elected Deputy Mayor yet again in an unsurprising turn of events.

Cr Tilbury's position as Deputy Mayor will remain until the end of this council's term, at the upcoming local elections in September where upon the community of Hornsby will decide.

Cr Tilbury has served on Council as a Ward A representative since 2012, and continues to be involved in political spaces, working in the office of the Member for Hornsby, Matt Kean. Cr Tilbury is seemingly ever the bridesmaid and never the bride, he is seen closely shadowing Mayor Philip Ruddock and Member for Hornsby, Matt Kean.

Two nominations were made for the Deputy Mayoral position, for Cr Nathan Tilbury and Cr Emma Hevde, who received five and four votes for Deputy Mayor, respectively.

Astoundingly, Hornsby Shire Council has not seen a female Mayor since Nan Horne's appointment in 1990, and a female Deputy Mayor since 2007 with Felicity Findlay.

Over the last ten years, Cr Tilbury has been elected Deputy Mayor twice, in 2013 and in 2022. Other previous Deputy Mayors included former Councillor Gurdeep Singh in 2014, former Councillor Michael Hutchence from 2015 to 2016 and again from 2019 to 2021, former Councillor Vince Del Gallego from 2017 to 2018, and Councillor Warren Waddell from February 2023 to February 2024.

Well known and active for over 20 years in the Hornsby community is Cr Janelle McIntosh who was first elected to Council in 2004 for one term and re-elected in 2017 and again in 2021.

Surely a councillor with a long history and deep roots in the community also deserves a shot at Deputy Mayor. And then there's Cr Emma Heyde, a very highly respected candidate for Mayor in 2017 and again in 2021 who then pulled strong numbers at

So why do the Liberal Councillors only vote in male Deputy Mayors where the females outnumber the male councillors 6 to 4 in Hornsby?

Hornsby Shire Council has a popularly elected Mayor, unlike neighbouring Councils where the Councillors elect the Mayor. The Deputy Mayor is then elected by the Councillors.

Mayor Philip Ruddock has been Mayor since 2017. The question is, upon this his 81st year, who is likely to succeed the long-standing Liberal Mayor in September

The Post wishes Cr Nathan Tilbury well as Deputy Mayor. However, the current trend of electing only men into the Deputy Mayoral position ignores a broader societal push for gender balance in leadership roles.

The population of Hornsby Shire is 51% female, so where is the recognition of the benefits of diverse perspectives in governance and decision-making. It stands to reason that a female councillor should have been elected for the Deputy position given a male holds the Mayoral position especially given the lack of female representation in this role to date.

Encouraging women into local government leads to more representative and comprehensive approaches to community challenges and opportunities.

The Post is keenly watching to see if a female Mayoral candidate will surface in the September local government elections.

Land Selling Concerns Again for Royal North Shore Hospital

The fate of the Royal North Shore Hospital is looking grim for some concerned citizens.

In 2023, the Northern Sydney Local Health District (NSLHD) put forth the RNSH Campus Masterplan. The document is a strategic plan for the next forty years, from 2023-2063, identifying zones for both clinical and non-clinical long-term expansion.

The Plan identifies the site of the eastern portion of the campus as a primary zone for clinical expansion, due to its proximity to the existing infrastructure. At the same time, the southern portion of the campus has been identified for "supportive service" expansion - carer accommodation, retail, corporate offices.

Property and Development NSW (PDNSW) owns the land to the south of the campus. Concerned citizens are outraged that the land was given to PDNSW, as that land is now out of the scope of the NSLHD. areas,' wrote Willoughby City Council.

'Over the years, two parcels of hospital land have already quietly been transferred from the Health portfolio to Property and Development NSW,' says a spokesperson from the SAVERNSH community group. 'The community would like to see the vacant parcel of land moved BACK to the Health portfolio and used for clinical services.'

Land selling has been a recurring issue for the Royal North Shore Hospital, where in 2021 the NSW Government proposed a 45 storey mixed use development on the site fronting Herbert Street.

Willoughby City Council released a statement assuring the community Council would write to the then Liberal Premier and key ministers to preserve the lands for future hospital growth.

'Council's concerns include the bulk and scale of the buy-to-rent tower, overshadowing of and loss of view from the nearby residential development and public open space

Community group SAVERNSH are further dissatisfied with the Masterplan due to the NSW Government's impending housing policy changes, which will see development around rail stations, and believe the Plan does not meet future demands of Sydney's growing

'The Royal North Shore Hospital Master Plan ... is an attempt by the state government to take a public facility and monetise it to solve short term political problems, rather than prepare the site to meet the medical needs of the future,' says SAVERNSH.

Lost Opportunity for Artarmon's Children

OPPORTUNITY class (OC) places at James said. Artarmon Public School are set to be slashed in half from next year.

The revelation of the Minn's Labor Government's cut of 30 OC places at Artarmon Public were revealed in the Sydney Morning Herald in March and strongly condemned by the Member for Willoughby Tim James.

"The opportunity classes at Artarmon Public have for decades held a high reputation for delivering our children with a quality, high standard education with academic rigour," Mr

"It's extraordinary that this Labor Government has reduced the educational opportunities available to our local children. Giving our children the best start in life must be a priority."


Currently Artarmon Public has four OC classes – two classes in both Years 5 and 6. Under the changes this would ultimately be reduced to one class in each year.

"The government should be investing in our education system and building up opportunity for all our children, not penny pinching from one community's children to help another's."

Mr James asserts that the places are "being ripped from Artarmon and being moved to other areas in the state where the entry requirements will be lower."

Mr James calls on the government to reverse this damaging decision as it could force locals to move out of the area to gain these valuable opportunities.

"I have written to the Minister for Education Prue Car seeking an urgent briefing on these changes and the implications for the school and our community," Mr James concluded.

What's Happening at Lizard Rock?

ossible development at "Lizard Rock" is stirring the community. Formally Crown land, the Metropolitan Local Aboriginal Land Council (MLALC) was granted the 71-hectare site following the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 to compensate

The MLALC have multiple land holdings across the Northern Beaches Local Government Area.

Aboriginal peoples for their historic

dispossession.

MLALC submitted a Planning Proposal in October of 2022 to the Department of Planning and Environment. Originally named Lizard Rock, the proposal was retitled to the "Patyegarang Planning Proposal" to be more culturally appropriate.

A Gateway Determination was issued in June 2023 to have the proposal put forward to public exhibition.

Northern Beaches Council have been outspoken in their opposition to the proposal, claiming extreme risk in the destruction of "45 football fields" of bushfire prone land.

Council raised concerns with the planning proposal, outlining that the time frame for consultation was too short to be meaningful; that there were inconsistencies with the documentation as the proposal mentioned 450 "dwellings" in some sections, while the term 450 "lots" were used in others; the loss of biodiversity; and that the proposal was inconsistent with established housing strategies for the LGA.

'Council wholeheartedly supports the

intent of the Aboriginal Land Rights Act but we cannot condone this particular proposal due to the extreme risks and impacts it presents,' wrote Northern Beaches Council in an October 2023 release.

Member for Wakehurst and former Mayor of Northern Beaches Council, Michael Regan, is similarly displeased with the Patyegarang Planning Proposal.

'Myself, other neighbouring state MPs, local Federal MPs, the Northern Beaches Council and local residents all oppose development at this site,' says Michael Regan. 'The Minns Government needs to kill this proposal off and find alternative sites for the developer.'

"Lizard Rock" was formerly under the electorate of Davidson, though since March of 2023 is now under the Wakehurst federal electorate. Member for Davidson, Matt Cross, has reservations concerning the

'Before the March 2023 election, a re-elected Perrottet Liberal-Nationals Government made the election commitment to protect this bushland,' says Matt

Cross. 'I call on the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, Paul Scully, or his delegate, who will be a final authority to determine if and how the land is rezoned, to not approve this proposal.'

Public exhibition submissions ended in November 2023, with a decision on the matter still pending. The MLALC are awaiting a finalisation assessment following the public exhibition, where the proposal is said to be updated to account for community and stakeholder concerns. If successfully approved, the next step would involve producing and submitting a Development

The Post has reached out to the MLALC for comment. At the time of publication, a response has not been provided. Any response will be updated in a future edition as we continue to bring the news to our community.

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
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Ku-ring-gai Council ... Convent Capers...

Por a Council that cannot find funds to support community requested projects, Ku-ring-gai seem to have no qualms spending on a Councillor "getaway".

The Post observed Ku-ring-gai Councillors and staff filtering into an exclusive, luxury accommodation, relaxed and smiling, on the 3rd of March for a two-night stay. Publisher of The Post Tina Brown had witnessed the arrival.

Two Councillors were not in attendance – Deputy Mayor Christine Kay from the St Ives Ward, and Cr Jeff Pettett of the Comenarra Ward.

Labelled as a "Councillors' Workshop", the agenda included housing policy, tree canopy preservation, progress and achievements over the Council's term, challenges and priorities, corporate planning, budget assessment management, significant updates, and organisational improvement.

The cost of the workshop, as The Post understand it, is estimated to have been at least 20,000 dollars.

This seems reasonable once you take into account the complimentary tea and coffee on arrival, with views of wineries and a rolling golf course. Not forgetting a conference menu that features pan seared grouper, lilliput capers, and pomme fondant. Of course, ratepayers across Ku-ring-gai have had to foot the bill.

If the need for such a boutique luxury conference wasn't peculiar enough, Councillors were spotted arriving with family members. With such a stacked agenda covering housing policy to asset management, it's hard to imagine how Councillors could have possibly carved out the time to enjoy the company of their families.

It becomes more peculiar still when looking at surrounding councils and their planned conferences, which don't involve overnight stays, spousal presence, or luxurious food and activities.

'Council holds an annual Councillor

strategic day, usually in February,' says Hornsby Shire Council spokesperson. 'Last year, this took place at the Storey Park Community Centre, where it will be likely held again in 2024.'

'In 2023, Council used a community facility, the Zenith Centre meeting rooms in Chatswood to hold a full day strategic planning workshop on financial sustainability,' says Willoughby City Council.

Ku-ring-gai Council appears to recognise that the economic health of the community is teetering, with Council passing a motion during the Ordinary Meeting on February 20th regarding community relief for cost-of-living pressures. It has been unanimously endorsed by all Councillors that an unbudgeted amount of 150,000 dollars will become available to local well known charitable organisations.

However, Council is seemingly forgoing community needs and awaited projects, namely Marian Street Theatre and the Lindfield Village Hub, and instead using funds to remove benches on moral grounds, The Post Exposes Ku-ring-gai Council's Luxury Escape



and hosting multiple Extraordinary meetings before their monthly Ordinary meeting has taken place. The unfocused, futile workings of Council is a testament to a lack of executive maturity, especially with only a handful of months left before caretaker mode and this year's Council elections.

What's more, it is strange Council had decided to travel in lieu of investing in local establishments. The Post can reveal that enquiries were made to the local Killara Hotel and Suites who had confirmed availability of the dates at a fraction of the cost. Questions on the necessity of having an elaborate, expensive workshop outside of the local Ku-ring-gai area are worth answering, considering Council support of the "Go Local First" campaign during the pandemic.

using local facilities, and whether ratepayers were fully funding the conference, a Council spokesperson had responded on the 4th of March, 'Councillors and senior staff have met once a year offsite for many years. It is productive and achieves good outcomes for the Council.'

Since this response, The Post has again questioned Council on the necessity of such an extravagant conference, though no further reply has been given.

After questions on the reason for not of the ten Ku-ring-gai Councillors responded. Cr Cedric Spencer of the Wahroonga Ward gave no explanation, and answered as a good use of ratepayers' money.' no questions in his reply.

> Cr Jeff Pettett, who did not attend the workshop, said, 'I did not attend this workshop as I was quite concerned with the cost to ratepayers and that the workshop was extravagance. not needed given that we have council elections in September of this year. Historically, there is a 50% turnover of councillors at each election meaning a number of the councillors that attended this Hunter Valley workshop will not be there post the election. We are in a cost of living crisis and

having a Hunter Valley workshop does not sit well with the wider community

From the Mayor



I am keen to share some of council's improvements in recent months.

Councillors regularly get contacted by residents who believe that their phone or

email queries had not been responded to. I asked for a customer service audit, and the review identified improvements to our training, procedures and systems which will lead to more timely responses in the coming months.

Residents have also shown concern about the ongoing loss of tree canopy and habitat destruction. While State law limits the scope of Council's response, we have recently introduced order provisions under the EP&A Act to require replacement planting of illegally removed trees, with regular follow-ups and fines if the order is breached.

As for our asset infrastructure backlog, we have identified new methods which may significantly bring down the cost of maintaining our ageing stormwater infrastructure. We expect overall savings of close to \$100m. This will put less strain on future spend, and more detail will be provided in the coming months.

Following the introduction of our library app, we are now investigating the provision of an app to cover broader council services. Watch this space.

Internally, councillors are also getting better follow-up to their queries, regular activity updates, and a proactive approach to regulatory change.

I know that there is further scope to improve, and we must push forward.

Our greatest challenge is the State Government's one-size-fits-all approach to housing. Through multiple meetings with the State Department and Planning Minister, they have not offered a timeframe and approach that is in line with community expectations. If these changes come through in April and July, it will at least double the dwellings across all of Ku-ring-gai and to date we have had no commitment on funding to fix existing infrastructure bottlenecks. We want to ensure that any uplift is backed by planning and funding for much-needed infrastructure and amenities.

Many in our community will be celebrating Easter, Passover and Ramadan. On behalf of Council I wish you all an enjoyable and peaceful time with family and friends.

The Minns Wrecking **Ball Protests**

arch 12th marked the start of what could be a train of community protests across Sydney in a bid to push back the controversial Transport-Oriented Development scheme (TOD), which targets medium and high-density apartment builds, with North Shore residents at the front of much of the push back.

Residents may have noticed the 'Minns Wrecking Ball' signs recently erected around train stations and local shop strips. These signs are hard to miss and represent a community group that is taking action to support their cause. The first protest was held in front of the NSW Parliament in the Domain, and more protests may follow.

A mix of residents from the Inner West, Blue Mountains, Hills Shire, and North Shore came together with banners and posters in hand, anxious about the possibility of their local community being destroyed or permanently changed by developers.

The term 'not in my backyard' or, more commonly, 'NIMBY' undoubtedly became the general energy among the crowd. While



community activism is always admirable, the protest seemed more about keeping the developments out of protesters' localities than a genuine concern for affordable housing or the housing crisis itself.

Partnering an ageing population with a growth in young families seeking housing, it seems more than necessary that the government endeavour to make something practical

Understandably, the landscape change will never sit quite comfortably with Sydneysiders who have lived most of their lives in Sydney; many would be happy for Sydney to remain the exact way it is from now on. However, the changes need to happen to give young people and new families a chance to share that same sense of security.

Threatening with a wrecking ball suggests the destruction of Sydney as we know it a metaphoric stretch, but the protesters' opinions were heard.

However, with pressure to fix a growing housing crisis, the question remains: Are these protests helpful in any way? What solutions do they offer besides a staunch 'No' to the housing crisis?

We are continually told that something needs to be done and that exploring other viable options would be a better approach to the housing crisis. But the reality is that the majority against NSW Premier Chris Minns' development scheme are not bringing any other practical alternatives to the table, rather than remaining completely anti-development.

Nevertheless, the demonstration saw some notable speakers, including Member for Bradfield Paul Fletcher, Member for Wahroonga Alister Henskens SC, MP, and Mayor of North Sydney Zoë Baker.

Not too Kean to Solve the Co-Ed **High School Dilemma in Hornsby**

Tith a growing population of young families eager to find adequate schooling options in their community, calls for genuine development to be done have again sparked up after a recent social media post from Member for Hornsby Matt Kean.

Kean took to social media and recently posted about the need for a co-ed high school North of Hornsby on social media.

"Following representation to the Department of Education about the need for a co-ed high school North of Hornsby, the department has agreed to commence consultation about options for our community." - Matt Kean, MP.

The Department of Education agreed to commence consultation on three proposals. The first is retaining the existing arrangements where families can choose between Asquith Boys or Asquith Girls and one existing co-ed option.

The second option is to reclassify Asquith Boys and Asquith Girls into two separate co-ed high schools.

The third and final option is merging Asquith Boys and Asquith Girls to become one large co-ed high school spread across one junior campus and one senior campus.

Sadly, proposals stop there, and the option for a new co-ed school has been left on the sidelines.

However, what makes this social media post somewhat interesting is that Matt Kean initially commissioned a feasibility study for a brand-new co-ed high school in Hornsby in 2021, slated to be finalised in

So, what happened to the possibility of a new co-ed school option?

Many residents are now sceptical and are calling on Kean to release the study so that they can see the results for themselves. The Post recently attempted to contact Kean's office about the feasibility study, which was apparently set to be finalised within the first quarter of 2022.

After a brief conversation with Kean's team, it's apparent that the feasibility study and a push for a new Co-ed school seemed to die out with the recent federal election. The Post was told that the Liberal Party no longer being in government has resulted in Kean's team not having any feasibility report or any numbers to show for it. A sad and rather abrupt end to any co-ed school push. Instead of providing any clarity to the study, The Post was told to look elsewhere for the feasibility details. This whole debacle does not excuse the fact Kean has been the Member of Hornsby for the last 13 years, but that mustn't be long enough to keep pushing for a new co-ed school.

No one can doubt that the proposals with the education department are amicable. However, there is a need to address the growing number of young families residing in the area. Additionally, the proposals need to provide the option for a completely new co-educational school.

Residents have commented on Kean's Facebook post regarding the community consultation on co-ed schooling.

"None of these options address the increase in the number of young families living in this area. Are any of the current schools capable of expansion? I would have thought a new co-ed high school, preferably north of current schools, should at least be considered."



Another local commented with similar views.

"Why is there no Option 4: Create a standalone Co-ed high school north of Hornsby."

Another comment asking for Kean's feasibility report.

"What happened to the feasibility study announced for a brand-new high school in Hornsby?"

It appears strange that a feasibility study would disprove a new co-ed school in Hornsby despite the apparent demand among locals.

The lack of co-ed high school options in the Hornsby Shire area continues to be a significant concern for families, and the lack of transparency from elected officials only adds to their frustration.

Patching over these issues by blending existing schools or not looking for a more expansive option to intake growing families will not fix the problem. A proposed new school should have been the primary option from the get-go.

The Post is now taking steps to seek out the Feasibility Study from the NSW Department of Education and will certainly bring that information to the community.

Northern Beaches Ratepayers Out of Pocket \$39 million Thanks to Cost Shifting

NORTHERN Beaches ratepayers it constrains our ability to maintain our were out of pocket \$39 million, or community.' \$379 per ratepayer, due to the NSW Government cost shifting.

Cost shifting refers to when state or federal governments force councils to absorb responsibility of infrastructure, services, and regulatory functions with support funding.

Commissioned by the LGNSW, independent consultants Morrison Low conducted a report for the 2021/2022 financial year, calculating the costs passed onto councils. In the report, NSW councils were found to have shouldered an accumulative \$1.36 billion because of cost shifting.

'Every dollar we pay to levies and subsidies to the state government, is one less dollar we can put into our local roads and footpaths, our parks and community centres or our libraries and events programs,' says Northern Beaches Mayor Sue Heins. 'Put simply,

According to the Cost Shifting Report for 2021/22, Northern Beaches Council paid \$6.4 million for the Emergency Services Levy, the highest in the state. This financial year, the Emergency Services Levy raised to \$9.3 million, equivalent to \$90 per ratepayer.

'Our community deserve better and this must stop,' says Mayor Heins.

Northern Beaches Council are set to write to the NSW Premier, Chris Minns, the NSW Treasurer, Daniel Mookhey, and the Minister for Local Government, Ron Hoenig. Council will request that cost shifting be addressed through regulatory reform, appropriate funding, and budgetary provision.

'I encourage the government to consider how this cost shifting is resulting in lost services, lost opportunity, and lost amenity for NSW residents and businesses and do something to fix it,' says Mayor Heins.

No Windscreen Fines on the **Northern Beaches**

NORTHERN Beaches Council have adopted the Revenue NSW Print and Post service for administrating fines. Instead of motorists having parking fines printed and left on windscreens, Council rangers will upload offences to the Revenue NSW

Revenue NSW developed this new system to counteract the problems with the old docket system. These issues included recipients being confused about the nature of their fines due to limited information, fines being removed leading to motorists being unaware they have committed an offence, and the administrative costs of sending out notices and letters.

With this new system, Council officers will continue to patrol parking, and once finding an offence, will document and photograph the infringement, sending the details to the Revenue NSW server. Revenue NSW will download the fine information and distribute it via email or the post on behalf of Council.

Northern Beaches Council were confident switching to this method of fine distribution due to success the system has had with 38 Councils across NSW.

Local **Opinions and** the **Development Updates at** the NTRA

The North Turramurra Recreational Area (NTRA) development debate is similar to the recent housing development proposals put forward by the NSW government. Change might not suit everyone; local residents never jump at the idea of a new development that changes the landscape of their community. But in the case of this developmental debate, change might be for the better.

Some community members are worried that the NSFA will monopolise the community space because the grandstand is being built there. This worry is a fair assumption, but the reality is that the NSFA doesn't operate in these fields every day of the week.

Sure, come game days on Saturday, young kids will use these fields for morning sport to more competitive adult competitions later in the day. But that's how weekend sports has always worked. Residents should be reassured that the fields will remain open for the community for school carnivals, exercise, and any other recreational activity throughout the week and during the 'offseason'.

CEO of the NSFA, Kevin Johnson, has provided an update on the grandstand development process.

"The design changes are open to community consultation until April 2024. You can see them and other information on the development on our website. The design changes were lodged with the Council about a month ago and need to be approved by the Ku-ring-gai Planning Panel (KLPP), which will be after the Council has undertaken its assessment and considered feedback from the community consultation."

Once the design changes are approved, the Council will then move to finalising the

lease and project deed with the NSFA.

The Post decided to visit the NTRA, chat with some local residents, and gauge their opinions on the development.

"I do worry about the extra crowds the grandstand will bring, but if it's only on

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the occasional weekend, I can't see it causing any great issues you already see at other local fields with kids' soccer or netball, I guess it's just part of having local teams." - Simon, 48.

"It'll be a nice addition to the space if the whole community can enjoy the fields when games aren't on." Emma,

Local community pages on social media continue to host discussions regarding the developments in North Turramurra.

"Everyone needs to make their voices heard otherwise, all our community space will be taken over by sporting groups. We all need access to our community-owned green space for not only physical activity and organised sport but for our mental health"

Another resident addressed their opinion on the matter.

"This is a classic case of a small but vocal minority trying to influence decisions for their own self-interest. The NTRA is a sporting facility that serves our local contribution to the 1.7 million Australians who play football. In terms of number of participants vs. area used, you would not find a more well-utilised area than the NTRA."

Locals are more than entitled to have their say about what happens in their community. However, local sport is a major aspect of a community's heartbeat. Fostering this heartbeat grows an unmatched communal unity that other suburbs would struggle to achieve.

Kirribilli Club Seeks Financial **Help to Secure Its Future**

he Kirribilli Club, a popular social club in Sydney that overlooks some ▲ of the city's most fantastic views, has reached out to its members to rally for financial assistance. In a recent email, the Club's Board and Management urged them to consider investing between \$10 million and \$15 million to either purchase the Club's property back from STADIA CAPITAL or relocate to a more affordable location within the area.

The Club is facing financial stress with a rental arrangement of over \$2 million per annum and an additional \$1 million in build $ing\,expenses.\,This \,has \,led\,the\,Board\,to\,decide$ not to exercise the rental renewal option, which was due to start in November 2024.

To secure its future, the Club is offering Debenture Certificates in favour of members' financial investment. The Debenture Certificate's indicative summary includes a value of \$2,000, a minimum of one certificate per expression of interest, and a maximum of unlimited certificates per expression of interest. The maturity date

for the debentures is flexible, ranging from 3 to 10 years, with an interest rate of 2% above the standard fixed-term reference rate. The interest payments will be made monthly, and the principal payments will be paid on debenture maturity.

The Club's Board and Management have requested their members' serious assistance in raising the necessary funds. They believe that the Kirribilli Debenture opportunity is the best solution for the Club's longevity and continued existence going forward.

The Club has set a deadline of midnight on Tuesday, 2nd April 2024, for the Expression of Interest offer. Members were encouraged to can register their support by completing an online form or by sending an email.

The Kirribilli Club has been a hub for social activities, entertainment, and dining for over 70 years. It has a rich history and a loyal membership base. The Club's Board and Management are hopeful that their members will rally to its support and help secure its future for generations to come.

"Ku-ring-gai Speaks Up"

acebook community groups have been growing in number over the years, with many of them serving as platforms for people to interact, share views, and have their say. However, there has been a growing concern about some of these groups that filter what people can say; it's also amusing to see the same names and opinions being cast onto the platform.

'The Ku-ring-gai Speaks Up' Facebook page was launched in March and has quickly become popular among locals who want to express their opinions without fear of censorship or exclusion. The page aims to provide a platform for people to share their views on a wide range of topics, from politics to local events and everything in between.

According to Chris Drake, the acting page administrator, the site upholds the values of freedom of speech, debate, and discussion, which are fundamental tenets of democracy. The page has become a safe space for people who feel their views are not being heard or acknowledged on other social media platforms.

One of the main issues that Ku-ring-gai Speaks Up seeks to address is filtering views on other community groups. Some locals feel that these groups do not give certain views a fair hearing and that the opinions shared lack diversity.

The rise of community groups in and around the North Shore that filter what people can say has become contentious in recent years.

While some argue that it is important to create safe spaces for people to express their views without fear of harassment or abuse, others believe that such groups can lead to the suppression of free speech and the exclusion of certain voices.

In response to this, community groups such as Ku-ring-gai Speaks Up have emerged, providing an alternative platform for those who feel that their voices are not being heard elsewhere.

Keep an eye out on your local community pages, what content gets shared, who's commenting on posts, and what your community page's true intentions are. The point I'm making is to not fall for political misinformation masked behind a community group, serving to push bias and suppress freedom of speech.

The Scary COST of Living

In December 2022, the ABS recorded a high 7.8% inflation rate. Since, inflation has fallen to 3.4% in the December 2023 guarter, though is still higher than the Reserve Bank of Australia's ideal inflation rate.

Inflation can be a dire problem for society, making money less valuable and requiring households to spend more on goods than they otherwise would during lower inflation periods.

This comes as Aussies have begun to feel the pinch at supermarket checkouts nationwide. Heading to your local supermarket


The original ANZACs forged the Anzac spirit of service and **L** mateship in World War One

tobacco, clothing and footwear, housing, furnishings, household equipment and services, health, transport, communication, recreation and culture, education, and insurance and financial services.

Despite these categories displaying a drop and a predicted continual drop in inflation, households are still feeling the punch of expensive, necessary goods and services.

The Post compared the top three supermarket chains, Woolworths, Coles, and ALDI, to find out how to save extra on the weekly grocery shop. While Woolworths and Coles were generally comparable, ALDI was consistently less expensive. Proving that there is a new player working its way into the supermarket duopoly club.

As Coles and Woolworths boast jaw-dropping profits while millions of Aussie families struggle, it begs the question of what is really going on. Why does ALDI, a far less established supermarket chain compared to Coles or Woolies, seem to be the only option that factors in the financial needs of its customers?

For example, 500 grams of beef mince would cost \$6.50 at Woolworths and Coles, but only \$5.79 at ALDI. A packet of potato chips while \$4.80 at Woolworths and Coles, was \$2.89 at ALDI. There was a significant difference between each respective store's homebrand orange juice prices per litre -\$3.13 at Woolworths, \$2.25 at Coles, and \$1.06 at ALDI.

On top of ridiculous petrol prices, the rental crisis, and home loan pressures, cautious grocery spending is a reality. Finding cheaper like-options, looking at the catalogues for sales, and removing frivolous spending becomes essential to staying afloat. While finding cheaper prices is tough, these results are clear that it's possible.

Inflation may be steadily decreasing but for many struggling households and families, not soon enough.



Improve your business using the "Customer Satisfaction Cycle"

very interaction with a customer, or a potential customer, is an opportunity to secure them as ongoing customers and to have them promote your business by being delighted with their experience. The initial interaction is crucial.

No matter whether the interaction is physical or virtual, their experience will determine if the person wants to be an ongoing customer or not. If they are delighted with the interaction, the chances of them becoming a return customer and recommending your business are greatly enhanced.

If the interface is with one of your people, the customer experience is completely in the hands of your Customer facing person. Their level of capability and personability will 'make or break' the customers' perceptions and the likelihood of them being delighted which usually leads to them being a return customer/ advocate.

I was reminded of this in a recent visit to one of our favourite cafes for brunch. We were greeted by a somewhat nervous but well-presented person. They showed us to a table, handed us menus, then departed. We waited but eventually I went to the staff member and let them know we were ready to order. They said "You order at the counter" which was not how it worked previously. I said, "We used to have our order taken at the table" and they said "Oh, sorry, I thought I told you to order at the counter" in a 'sheepish' manner. I said, "Oh, ok. Where do I get water?" They said

"Oh, didn't I give you any? I'll bring it over.?"

This demonstrated the following:

- The café had changed its procedures, most likely to reduce 'wait-staff'.
- I suspect the new procedures were not documented.
- The staff members had not been properly trained on the procedures.
- The café management (owners?) had failed to devise and implement the new procedures from their Customers' viewpoint.
- There was no clear 'customer feedback'

Whilst this is a relatively simple example, the same 'delighting customers' approach applies no matter the size of the business:

- Devise customer service processes, from their viewpoint, with the involvement of your customer facing staff.
- Document the processes, using 'flow charts' where possible.
- Trial the processes and improve them, involving front line staff, and customer feedback.
- Once defined and finalised, train you people on the processes and continually ensure they are being implemented using Customer satisfaction surveys and staff input for feedback
- Continually improve the processes as

necessary.

Systemising customer service/satisfaction processes and training staff on them may seem expensive, however losing customers and staff turnover due to having to deal with dissatisfied customers will be a much higher cost to the business.

As a key component of attracting and retaining customers, devise processes from a customer viewpoint, document them, continually refine them, train your staff, implement them, gain customer/ staff feedback, adjust your processes accordingly, then endlessly apply this as a "Customer Satisfaction Cycle" system.

I do hope that café's management (and managers of all size businesses) reads this article and implements the "Customer Satisfaction Cycle" system... we really want to keep going back!

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Coercive Control Laws in NSW Underway

rom July 2024, coercive control will be a criminal offence in New South Wales.

Though, what is coercive control?

Coercive control refers to abuse that is aimed at scaring, intimidating, or hurting an intimate partner to control them. Recognising coercive control may be difficult, though it often takes the form of gaslighting, restricting or controlling access to finances, dictating what a person can wear or who they are able to engage with, or socially isolating a partner to restrict their freedoms.

Simone's confronting story revealed that long before her ex-partner committed violent abuse, there were warning signs that are now recognised as acts of coercive control. Her abuser attempted to cut Simone off from friendships, money would go missing from her home, and he would grow overly affectionate when Simone decided she needed space.

Though those who commit acts of coercive control may not be immediately physically abusive, ensuring there is no escalation to violence is vital.

The NSW Domestic Violence Death Review Team reported in a 2017-2019 study that of the intimate partner and family homicides that occurred, not all contained physical abusive behaviours.


Though, evidence of controlling behaviour was found, leading the DVDRT to note the complex nature of these abuse cases.

In March of 2020, then NSW Attorney General, now Leader of the NSW Opposition, Mark Speakman, indicated to the NSW Parliament that controlling behaviour should be addressed and laws should be discussed.

Coercive control laws are being put into motion after the NSW Parliament passed the Crimes Legislation Amendment Act in November of 2022.

The Sydney Harbour Bridge is 92 years old this year and tolls on the Bridge and Sydney Harbour Tunnel have long been one-way, with infrastructure costs fully repaid years ago.

I've stood up in Parliament and moved a motion condemning these moves and directly asked of the Minister in Question Time to assure the motorists of NSW that they will not be any worse off under the Government's tolling reforms. The Minister declined to give that guarantee instead displaying contempt for the real concerns faced by local motorists and families.

In Government, the Liberals invested in building new road infrastructure such as the Western Harbour Tunnel. The current government is instead cancelling local road projects such as Beaches Link - without any congestion busting alternative - and adding tolls to infrastructure long paid off.

Labor is responsible for the existing tolls in the Willoughby area - M2, Lane Cove Tunnel and Military Road ramp.

These potential reforms come on top of Labor recently abolishing a scheme that offered half price registration to good drivers that saved motorists hundreds of dollars

The Australian Disability Young Adults Social Support Group **Breaks Barriers and Builds Bonds**

he Australian Disability Young Adults Social Support Group breaks barriers and builds bonds.

Australian Disability Young Adults Social Support Group (ADYASSG) is a non-profit organisation that provides fortnightly activities for people with primarily physical disabilities in the North Shore and Northern Beaches of Sydney. A chance for Aussies with physical disabilities to socialise and catch up in a similar community.

The group was formed to address the social isolation that people with disabilities face due to a lack of suitable social support in the local community. The inspiration behind the group was simple... to fill a gap in the local community.

There were groups for people with intellectual disabilities, but none for young adults with physical disabilities.

Jonathan Shar, the Coordinator of the Australian Disability Young Adults Social Support Group, said that the aim of the group is "to create a more equitable Australian society for people with disabilities through the production of online media and platforms, as well as face-to-face interactions to increase

the visibility of issues facing the disability community."

The group meets every fortnight in Gordon, between the Northern Beaches and the North Shore of Sydney. During the meetings, participants engage in a variety of activities such as discussions, quizzes, chair exercises, games, sing-a-longs, crafts, mindfulness, laughter yoga, and more. The upbeat and exciting programs change every time based on participant needs.

Jonathan, responsible for marketing and organising activities, said the group is still building. Still, so far, group members have been overly satisfied with the Support Group, which is creating more opportunities for unique social interaction.

The diverse range of activities offered during meetings reflects a thoughtful and participant-centric program. The adaptability of the program to meet participant needs each time showcases a commitment to individual preferences and a dynamic response to the group's evolving requirements.

The Australian Disability Support Group is making great strides toward creating some real positive change by addressing the challenges facing Australians with disabilities. Every Aussie face challenges, but those groups who possess various disabilities can feel these challenges tenfold. Challenges such as the cost of living, uncertainty over NDIS reviews, discrimination, and the need for suitable social support are critical issues that the group is actively addressing through support programs and raising

Jonathan pointed out that the community often assumes that people with physical disabilities are intellectually disabled and treat them in a patronising, childish, and demeaning way, which is also not appropriate for people with intellectual disabilities.

The Australian Disability Support Group is working towards challenging these societal assumptions and promoting inclusivity.

In addition to the support group, Australian Disability also runs a weekly podcast called 'CripChat' Australia. CripChat Australia is produced and delivered by Australian Disability, and it aims to educate, entertain, and inform the community on how to create a more accessible and inclusive society for people with disabilities, their friends, and family. The podcast is live-streamed every Friday via Facebook, YouTube, and Twitter, and an edited version is released later.

New Legal Aid for Family Law Property Matters



roperty settlements pursuant to separation require a number of legal steps to finalise them. This includes full and frank financial disclosure by each of the parties, mediation to try and achieve an agreed settlement, and entering into consent orders to be approved by the court.

Where no agreement is reached at mediation, the matter can proceed to litigation.

Recent policy changes to grants of Legal Aid for some property matters are aimed at helping the financially disad-

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Australian Menopause Surveys 5,000 Women

Linda Dear, a specialist GP Alinda Dear, a specialist Grand a certified menopause practitioner with the North American Menopause Society, conducted a survey of Australian women.

With over 5,000 participants, the survey was aimed at documenting and revealing menopausal symptoms, and how they impact women's healthcare, women in the workplace, and women at home. Dr Dear conducted the same survey on New Zealand women earlier in 2023.

Both datasets were collected in hopes to enhance awareness of menopause and perimenopause, and to have women prepared for this life-altering stage.

Most Australian and New Zealand women who participated in the survey revealed that they did not recognise their symptoms as menopause or perimenopause while experiencing

from the NZ study.

Both surveys found that the top physical menopausal symptom for women was sleep problems (81% for AU and 80% for NZ), while the top psychological symptom was fatigue (77% from the AU, 79% from the

Most of the other top reported symptoms, including body pains, weight gain, night sweats, were all between 70 to 75% in both surveys for Australian and New Zealand

Results were fairly similar between the two nationalities, with 82% (AU) and 84% (NZ) reporting that menopausal symptoms impacted their work; 88% revealed menopause has negatively impacted their relationship with their partner; and 87% (AU) and 85% (NZ) said menopause has inquiry. negatively impacted their sex life.

The largest point of difference in the re- visit sults was in relation to induced menopause, which is where menopause is caused by

t the tail end of 2023, Doctor them - 73% from the AU study, and 64% treatments that damage women's ovaries. After undergoing induced menopause, 39% of Australian women expressed they felt unprepared, while 66% of New Zealander women felt unprepared.

> Menopause is a reality to be faced by almost all women, globally. According to Dr Linda Dear's research, although symptoms and situations vary, most women have more in common reporting the effects of

Dr Dear believes raising awareness is key to limiting these effects.

In November of 2023, the Australian Senate called for an inquiry into menopause and perimenopause, looking at the mental, physical and economic impacts. Dr Linda Dear, and her organisation "Menodoctor" submitted the survey to the Senate's

The Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Parkinson Association Inc. provides a range of activities for its members, including a weekly choir, fitness group, walking group, and craft group. The group also hosts monthly meetings and annual events, such as a picnic at Bobbin Head and a concert featuring Principal Artists from Opera Australia.

Rose emphasises the importance of community and socialising for people with Parkinson's, which helps them fight PD, improve their attitude, and maintain fitness. According to Rose, the group has over 100 members who come from various places, including the Hills district, Artarmon, the Northern Beaches, and the locals. The charity also invites speakers to share information on current research developments and

practical solutions to shared problems.

"Our only tools to fight PD at the moment are attitude and fitness. We need to laugh and share stories and feel we are fighting this together. And carers need to know they are not alone. - Rose Parkin.

Rose recently wrote a poem titled "We Are Tired," which reflects the struggles that people with Parkinson's face every day. However, she believes that getting together and sharing information, as well as having a laugh together, is essential to combating the challenges of Parkinson's. 




